Work is Underway on World Premiere Project Based on "The World's Weirdest Book"

A creative team of internationally-recognized artists, including two BSA graduates, began this summer to develop an original multi-media project to be performed by BSA students in April 2015. The team has spent considerable time at BSA and will be working closely with students throughout the year to bring this imaginative piece, based on Codex Seraphinianus by Luigi Serafini, to life. Through 3-D video, dance, orchestral and vocal music, BSA's Codex will describe a strange world that has some similarities to and many differences from our world. The project is bringing BSA faculty and students in contact with the cutting-edge art world and informing our community of current artistic trends and the professional life of young artists today. BSA grad '97, dancer Kate Fisher, is currently working with students in the afternoons choreographing the dance. An acclaimed professional choreographer, Kate is premiering part of Codex at the Wave Rising Series in New York November 7-9, 2014. Nadia Sirota, BSA '00, is the producer of BSA's project. She and Kate are working closely with David Title, a video specialist in 3D Projection Mapping and Marcos Balter, a composer. Much of the work is taking place in BSA's Center for Collaborative Arts & Technology. Codex will be the centerpiece of BSA's 3rd Annual Multi-Disciplinary Festival which will also feature original works by students. There will be a short preview of Codex at Expressions, March 7-10, 2015 with the official premiere April 17&18. Save the dates!
